Challenges & proposed solutions

- The DCWC meeting with participation of one representative of PA member from every commune, previously planned by the project, has been re-arranged by the head of District, to be organized quarterly, based on its routine work and administrative occupation. The project team has then to accept flexibly according to district scedule.
- The timeline set for PA bimonthly meeting with PA member and parents in the village has not been exactly respected. To maintain regularly the meeting, the project team and the PA lelder must regularly contact each other in advance to commonly set meeting time depending on their avalibility and seasoning agricultural products. Therefore the start of the meeting can be either held in the morning or in the afternoon.

Successes, innovations, unexpected results, lessons learned

- The success of the project comes from active participation of commune council member, CCWC member, head of commune, school principal and representative of cluster school. With regard to actual situation of the working areas, the project team has added extra-teaching of law on suppression of gumbling which was happily received and discussed vividly.

Identify any challenges or success related to systems and network strengthening (referral networks, working with partners, linking with government, participation in networks etc.) that you have experienced over the past six months

- On 21 March 2012, CCWC member informed project team with joint written report, communicated also to LICADHO, ADHOC and Banteay Srei, about one violation case. At around 18:00, a nun went buying fishes and saw a man sitting under a tree with a small girl, but she did not pay attention, presuming that was an affair of parent and his daughter. When she returned back at around 19:30, she heard the girl cry that forced her to approach the place and see clearly. As reaction the man attacked the nun verbally including the monks around. In the same time, the parent of the victim accompanied by some villagers walked rapidly in her direction. She called the crowd and showed the offender to the crowd. The villagers arrested the man, named Thoan Bun, 45 years old, and brought him to the police station. At the police station, Khy Srei Neang, 5 years old reported that the man had brought her from the playing ground to a shading tree in Prey Khlot pagoda of Tuol Kaki village, and then he took her cloth off, and he touched emotionally her vagina in laying himself on her.

After reading the report, the project manager went to see CCWC again for clarification and then returned to contact the parents to verify the development of the case and to be informed of what the family had done, if they need additional assistance? The parents confirmed that the offender was already sent to Battambang and they are now waiting for official convocation to attend the hearing. Later the Battambang court issue a citation calling them to join

the court on 28 April, but unfortunately the citation reached them too late, and the court has now postponed the hearing to a future date. The team project team continue to track the case by keeping close contact with CCWC and parents to see if anything appear not in conformity with judicial process^{**} .
