II-Project Purpose:

- To reduce poverty
- To promote healthy students by having them rotatively and medically checked.
- To counsel some dropped out children by moral reinforcement, provision of school material and food supply encouraging them to rejoin school mainstream regularly;
- To maintain retention of poor, orphan and children living with families affected by HIV/AIDS in the mainstream school by provision of school materials, uniforms, and food supply allowing them to complete school cycle;
- To reinforce capability of some weak students by paying remedial fee permitting them to equalize with their classmates;
- To assist young children of high age not attending school in having chance to attend vocational training for their future business.
- To offer small capital to some volunteer children who accept to practice livestock and vegetable farming at their domicile, or planting in the OEC terrain;
- To grant loan to poor students' parents allowing them to undertake small business whereby they can liberate their children to attend schools regularly that can reduce drop-out rate.

III-Targeted Areas:

The project has been run in three communes of Sangker district, which are Roka, Raingkesei and Tapon commune:

1. In Roka commune: The project has been operating in 6 villages: Ta-Hen1, Ta-Hen2, Roka, Ambaing Thgnê, Po-battambang and Chhoung Tradak
2. In Raingkesei commune: The project has been operating in 5 villages: Raingkesei, Raing Kraul, Damnak Danfkor, Svay Cheat and Tuol Snuol.
3. Tapon: The project has been operating in 3 villages: Tapon, Baset and Samdech

IV-Activities and Outcomes:

A-Cooperation with territorial authorities and related institutions for selecting targeted groups:

- In early January 2011, cooperated with commune council members, principal of primary and secondary school in the new target area of Tapon to select new 20 targeted children, of which 14 girls. These children started receiving food supply, medical clearance from 21 January, including payment for remedial fee to some weak student. They will receive school materials and uniforms from September 2011.
- On 15 February 2011, with the fund of the Foundation Schmitz-Stiftungen, OEC has bought a terrain of 1600m² worth of \$2,300.00 located in Roka commune, for agricultural practice to be accomplished by targeted children;
- From March 2011, with the endorsement of the proper commune, the project has provided removal fund to the following targeted people: - Tapon: 8 families; -Roka: 2 families and Reang Kesei: 2 families, a total fund of **4,900,000Riels** for a period depending on their actual business;

G-Follow-up the development of the enterprise runners

-The project team performs regularly a monthly follow up of all managing activities exercised by all the borrowers in the view of giving them some additional advice or responding to any questions

depending on the varied happening situation at the reason of two places each.

- The team has noted that children of the business practitioners attend regularly their class with a serious learning behavior.
- The tailor, motorbike repairer, seller of vermicelli, and seller of frying meat have shown their capability of repaying back their money lent.
- Three months after getting money for raising individually a pair of pig, all the four raisers succeeded to show a positive result proved by their healthy animal in good raising condition, including breeding and sheltering.

H-Distribution of monthly food supply

In economical spirit, the project has bought rice 10,650Kgr for stock in advance, the time where the rice was in cheap price. The effective supply distribution has been started from the end January 2011. According to an established monthly schedule, before the distribution, the project staff members use around 30mn. to input knowledge and the daily practice of child's rights, roles and duties of students toward parents and teachers, mutual aid for common development. The project staff members repeatedly encourage them to seriously learn and strictly do homework responding to assignment designed by teachers. The remarks noted during follow-up have also been clarified and explained to eliminate all spirit of neglect and reinforce permanent effort for self-development.

V-Challenges

- Presently there are still some small number of the poorest families, around 3.5% continues to bring their children with them when going to have a work pay during seasoning period of collecting maize in the zones bordering Thailand. Facing this problem, after their returning the project staff members have been going to contact them with their family members to convince them to reserve favorable time for adjustment the time lost.

- Some children, in spite of our support, especially the orphans living with grand mother or with their widow mother abandon class for earning their life, around 2,7% that will oblige the project team to study with local authorities and educational officials to recruit new available target for replacement.

The project team faced some difficulties in distributing food supply during October 2011, caused by the flood, but everything went on as planned with constant effort of adapting transport steps to the real requirement.

VI-Good collaboration and responsiveness of community members

All local authority members from village to communal level are very collaborative and responsive to all project activities, including consultation and recruiting targeted children with paying attention to advising students to respect the recommendations and orientations given the day of food supply distribution. Parents and head of villages show their frankness in discussing openly with project team the way for developing their children intellectually and technically. Many teachers express their happiness to see positive effect of the project in allowing poor children to attend the mainstream school, while they are alone cannot do that because of lacking physical support, and they wish to see a permanent continuance.

VII-Outcome

- The project causes Good communication with friendly manner, and full of respect of other in being always courteous and accepting partners' ideas for common analysis and decision making, a way of developing democracy and human rights through effective mobilization and participation from all local levels and parents to form personalities of children. This gives a new birth to resolving some necessary problems together that reinforces confidence and trust in OEC team. Frequent visit and direct talk with parents and proper teachers about learning effort and progress of children becomes moral and psychological force encouraging children to learn seriously with happiness. Familial relation between children and parents appears in an atmosphere of love and happiness.

We recognize frankly that we cannot reach our goal at 100%, because external factors which still remain in cause, economical situation, natural resources management and political environment. Therefore we face some small abandon.

VIII-Next Activities Plan

- From July to December 2011, OEC will focus its activities in the 3 targeted communes, Tapon, Roka and Raingkesei commune, on supervision of learning process at home: time spent, and possibility of forming learning group with assistance of project staff.
- From 1st August to 3 October 2011, it will be a long term of vacation. In this period, project staffs will focus their activities on organizing friendly talk during food supply distribution and during the time of follow-up on child protection against domestic violence, child agricultural abuse, and the use of child in some commercial activities which can reduce learning effort to recommence the new school term. Additionally the project team will discuss clearly the role of family as fundamental support for social development and building good personalities of children. The close and loving relation of parents is very important in directing learning behavior and constant effort of

children. The team will also pay great attention to children living with family members affected by HIV/AIDS advising them to maintain learning atmosphere during the vacation time as normal learning period, by not profiting this time for using children in domestic business.

- The distribution of uniform and learning material will take place as usual from 23 September before the new school term, while the monthly food supply and medical clearance remains regularly in their flow.
- Concerning young people to be vocationally trained, among the 9 people in the plan, 5 have been already recruited, and in learning course, 2 in Cosmetics, 2 in Beauty shop and 1 in Computer training. The team must try to find 4 more for completion the plan.
- Continue monthly visit for the 8 families practicing their own enterprise in the view of giving moral and technical reinforcement for their daily practice.
